Adams Inn provides daily and weekly rates for single and shared rooms. Each guest room has a unique décor. Some rooms have a private bath, and others have a wash basin in the room and a shared bath down the hall. All rooms are air-conditioned. Adams Inn is located two miles north of the White House and in close proximity from the National Zoo. It is served by the Woodley Park Zoo Metro station on the red line. Adams Inn has 14 rooms with private baths and 11 rooms with shared bath. Rates are \$40-\$95 daily or \$220 weekly for room with shared bath.

Community living is a quirky---and considerably more expensive---alternative to regular housing options. However, these arrangements often provide both room and board (2 daily meals), which account for some of their higher cost. Thompson-Markward Hall is located 4 blocks from Union Station near C St., across from the Hart Senate office building. Metro: Union Station or Capitol South. Women ages 18-34 only. 112 dorm-like singles and 4 doubles line the old but clean hallways. Small bedrooms have A/C and phones (personal extensions); communal baths are large and clean. Laundry room. Weekly maid service provided. Bring your own sheets. Breakfast and dinner served cafeteria-style in a pleasant dining hall. First floor common areas are elegant and spacious, including a piano, library, and garden. TV lounge in the basement has cable, VCR, and couches. Indoor bike storage. Men are not allowed beyond the lobby. No alcohol, cooking appliances, or smoking inside building. Make summer reservations by early Mar. Non-refundable \$50 deposit (credited to rent) required with reservation. 2-week minimum stay, 2-year maximum. \$147 per week, \$650 per month.

Metro: Woodley Park/Zoo. Located in the safe and friendly Woodley Park district in Northwest Washington DC, the elegant brick building of the Boston University Washington Center is home to Boston University's Washington Internship and Journalism Programs during the academic year. During summers, it opens its excellent facilities to all summer interns to enjoy. The building includes laundry facilities, a library/study lounge and a well-equipped computer center. The housing consists of three-bedroom apartments equipped with A/C, cable TV, two bathrooms, common area and a kitchen complete with silverware, dishes, cooking utensils and pots and pans. Floors are carpeted. Apartments house six residents. Minimum stay of 8 weeks required. Non-refundable deposit of \$300 required in order to secure housing. Available late May-early Aug. \$27 per night; limited number of singles are available at \$35; not all requests for singles can be honored.

## **Apartments**

Unless you're planning on permanently relocating to D.C., subletting an apartment in the District is a smart idea. Newspaper listings often include apartments for rent or sublet, as well as requests for roommates and housesitters. Check the Washington Post (especially F-Su) and the CityPaper (Th). Although the CityPaper is available in print on Thursday, an online version is accessible at [www.washingtoncitypaper.com](http://www.washingtoncitypaper.com) beginning at 3pm on Tuesday. Access the online version as soon as possible, because apartments vanish before the print version of the paper hits the streets. For apartments on Capitol Hill, check out Roll Call ([www.rollcall.com](http://www.rollcall.com)) and The Hill ([www.hillnews.com](http://www.hillnews.com)). Only a few online apartment-search websites exist for D.C., and some charge a fee. Try [www.thesublet.com](http://www.thesublet.com), [www.apartments-in-washington-dc.net](http://www.apartments-in-washington-dc.net), <http://washington-dc-apartments.com>, [www.jdpost.com](http://www.jdpost.com), or [www.relocationcentral.com](http://www.relocationcentral.com).
