In 2017, the ODU Center for Global Health signed an MOU with Healthy Chesapeake to support the evaluation effort for Health Chesapeake program activities. Healthy Chesapeake was created under the leadership of the Chesapeake Health Department and city leaders to address health issues focusing on the low Healthy Opportunity Index (HOI) communities in Chesapeake. The program uses community-driven approaches to implement nutrition education, promote access to healthy food, encourage an active lifestyle, and improve chronic diseases such as diabetes and high blood pressure. Healthy Chesapeake projects emphasize community empowerment as an integral part of the interventions that include the Hub (diabetes and blood pressure management), family planning services, SPARK (after school program for children), and nutrition education classes, art and healthy brain, Master Garden project, ambassadors training, and active lifestyle projects.

The three priority areas the working group focused on consist of safe communities, chronic disease prevention, and sexual health.

Zika Mosquito Control Summer Project

To reduce the risk of human transmission of the virus in the Hampton Roads region, the Old Dominion University Center for Global Health has partnered with the Norfolk Department of Public Health (NDPH) and the Eastern Virginia Medical

School (EVMS) Graduate Program in Public Health to create a service learning opportunity in vector control called the Zika Mosquito Control Summer Project. The project was implemented from July 2017 to August 2017. The Center for Global Health recruited a total of 5 students from ODU and EVMS to participate in the project. To cover the height of the mosquito season, the students worked over two five-week sessions. These sessions offered the students an opportunity to work closely with mosquito control specialists from the Norfolk Department of Public Health to learn about the fundamentals of mosquito control and surveillance. Students learned about the Integrated Vector Management (IVM) mosquito program, which places an emphasis on source reduction surrounding potential vectors of Zika virus such as the Aedes albopictus mosquitoes. Another learning activity involved working with a vector control biologist from the public health department in field and lab work. The field work involved setting mosquito traps so that the mosquitoes could later be identified at the species level in the vector control laboratory. The students were also given an opportunity to work with vector control specialists in conducting backyard mosquito inspections. During this activity, students were able to engage in mosquito habitat identification and community education. Other activities involved working with the epidemiology office at the NDPH to learn how reported infectious diseases are handled within the city. The Zika Mosquito Control Summer Project provided an avenue for students to engage in a service learning project that not only furthered their educational goals but also offered them an opportunity to support local mosquito control and surveillance efforts.

Global Health Heroes was a collaboration between the Center for Global Health and Horizons Hampton Roads in Virginia Beach, VA. Horizons offers enriching summer programs to students to inspire them to strive for a well-rounded, successful future. The program was targeted towards low-income, elementary students. The purpose of Global Health Heroes was to teach students about global health and each individual's responsibility to the earth, which makes each person a global citizen. In late July 2017, the center designed an illustrative Power-Point presentation to teach students the fundamentals of global health and fun, interactive games to reinforce learning. The Power Point presentation addressed scenarios for communicable illnesses, nutrition, and prevention strategies. One of the goals of the presentation was to ensure students understood that there are no borders in health. Health

diseases and concerns are all over the globe, including in their own homes and communities. That is why it's so important to practice and promote good health in hopes to collectively improve health worldwide. In workstation 1, students played a climate change board game that teaches them negative and positive outcomes of each of their environmental choices and a recycling sorting game which teaches them the various household items that are recyclable. In workstation 2, students were taught about the different food groups and types of health foods through a nutrition bingo game. Lastly, the students ended the program with a poster session themed "What It Means To Be A Global Health Hero". Students were awarded t-shirts and certificates to signify their commitment to themselves, their community and their world.

The impact of transportation on public health has continued to be an important issue to address in the United States (US) and Hampton Roads area. The National Center for Environmental Health and Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry believes that in order to build and maintain healthy communities, it is necessary to understand the impact of transportation choices on health. There are six main ways the transportation environment affects health in the US according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention: Safety, Active transportation, Air quality, Connectivity to destinations, and Equity (National Center for Environmental Health, 2015). The Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization also

identifies many of these factors as the major areas to focus for the Hampton Roads region in order to achieve long-term sustainability (Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization, 2012). After meeting with key stakeholders in transportation in 2016, the Old Dominion University Center for Global Health (ODUCFGH) made addressing transportation and public health issues in the Hampton Roads region a key priority for the center. The ODUCFGH launched the Public Health and Transportation Working Group and a Public Health and Transportation Data Archive site in 2016 after hosting an initial workshop which brought experts in the fields of transportation and health together to discuss key issues from a two-day webinar from the National Academy of Sciences.

On September 11, 2017, the Center for Global Health hosted another Public Health and Transportation workshop at the School of Community and Environmental Health from 2:30 PM to 4 PM. In attendance were 17 participants from organizations, such as the Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization (HRTPO), Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), Hampton Roads Transportation, Inc (HRTI), Virginia Modeling, Analysis and Simulation Center (VMASK), Strafford University, and the Center for Global Health. The goal of the workshop was to review the results of the needs assessment survey distributed through Qualtrics to all members of the transportation group from May 2017 to August 2017. The Director of the Center for Global Health, Dr. Muge Akpinar-Elci, opened the session by welcoming participants and presenting the agenda of the workshop. After the introductory remarks, Ms. MyNgoc Nguyen, program manager at the Center for Global Health who was responsible for the survey design, administration, and analysis, reported the findings. Participants asked questions related to the survey results and what these mean for the focus of the working group. They were also given the chance to provide their input on a grant opportunity that addresses the desired focus of the working group. This part was followed by a general discussion on the next steps to be taken by the group. The participants agreed on the following recommendations as the next steps of the working group:

- Creation of a consortium with guest speakers, panel discussions, and community engagement to discuss current health and transportation topics/issues in Hampton Roads
- Compare data on bike path usage with health data (health per bike mile) and analyze the economic benefits of bike paths (show evidence that bike paths can affect health and, therefore, lead to economic benefits)
- Examine accessibility to the Emergency Room to promote healthy transportation
- The group also identified the need to extend some of the projects to graduate students as a part of their practicum work and, potentially, their PhD projects.

Gaming Against Drug Abuse Program

The Center for Global Health staff visited Ghent Montessori Middle School to educate middle-schoolers on how drugs and alcohol can adversely affect the human body and the benefits of making smart decisions about drugs. The event focused on the use of prescription drugs, New Psychoactive substances (NPS) and alcohol. A pretest and posttest survey was used to test the knowledge and attitudes of the students. First, students were given a brief presentation regarding key points about prescription drugs and NPS to emphasize the importance of healthy preventative drug behavior. Next, students were broken down into teams and asked questions regarding prescription drugs and NPS through a fun and interactive trivia game. The trivia game helped the team shatter the myths of drug use. The center gave students factsheets, developed using toolkits provided by the National Institute of Drug Abuse, which had answers to the jeopardy questions. This helped facilitate teamwork/collaborative environment where students were able to discuss among themselves and work through the trivia questions before providing a team response. Additionally, the fact sheet reinforced the student's learning and helped increase their understanding of the different types of drugs. The educational event was overwhelmingly popular among the young students and teachers.

Let's Move: A Program Evaluation for the Virginia Beach Department of Public Health and the Virginia Beach Department of Parks and Recreation.

The ODU Center for Global Health continued to collaborate with VB Heath Department and Park & Rec for the Let's Move Project. The Let's Move Virginia Beach (LMVB) healthy eating and physical activity intervention was developed by the Virginia Beach Public Health and Parks and Recreation Departments to combat childhood obesity. To counteract the apparent decline in healthy behaviors in adulthood, children ages 5 to 11 in the after-school program were targeted for an intervention. The desired behavior changes for the LMVB intervention included 1) reduced sugared beverage consumption, 2) choosing correct portions and foods from the myPlate.gov food groups, and 3) increased physical activity. Each LMVB lesson included a short lecture, a relay race to reinforce the lesson concepts, and physical activity in the form of dancing. Every child received an item to take home

(e.g., a water bottle to reinforce drinking water instead of sugared beverages) and a letter for parents with the lesson concepts and recommendations for behavior motivation and change.

Global Health Certification Program

Figure 1. Annual revenue generated by the center



Figure 2. Research Activities in 2014-2016


