NOTE: Admission to the BFA program is open to all students. Since it is a professional arts program with a continuance portfolio, students are expected to begin their foundation courses in their first year. It is important for students who are considering the BFA as an option to consult with the chief departmental advisor before or during their first semester at Old Dominion University. This plan is merely a guide, not a guarantee, and is predicated upon course availability and enrollment. To reduce fall or spring semester loads, some courses can be taken during the summer.

Students seeking continuance into the BFA program must first complete at least 15 hours of foundation courses with a minimum grade of C. Students must then submit a portfolio of their work for evaluation by a designated faculty committee and indicate their intended area of concentration.

**All BFA students must choose one of the following concentrations after completion of the 15 hours of foundation courses: Drawing and Design, Fibers, Graphic Design, Three Dimensional Media, Painting, Print and Photo Media. See catalog and consult advisor.*
