

### Why Study Abroad?

## Virginia Museum Exploration: ILC's Visit Richmond





## Annual Campus Theme (ACT)

### Radical Jewelry Makeover (RJM) Project

**Emily Culver**, Assistant Professor of Art, is leading students through a Radical Jewelry Makeover project in her ARTS 495 course as part of the Annual Campus Theme, **Transitions**. The course collaborated with students from Virginia Commonwealth University and Longwood University to collect donations of unwanted, unused, or broken jewelry from the surrounding community. The donations were then turned into new artworks to be exhibited and available for purchase.







Guest lecturers, **Curtis Arima** and **Kathleen Kennedy**, were also invited to campus to share their expertise on design strategies and metalsmithing. Throughout the course, students have received instruction on the ethical and sustainable practices alongside traditional jewelry and metalsmithing techniques. ## FIRST AND SECOND YEAR SUCCESS INITIATIVES

### PEER ACADEMIC SUCCESS MENTORING

**Peer Academic Success Mentors** are available to meet with students to identify unique learning strengths, develop individual plans for academic support, and promote self-confidence and independence in areas such as study skills, time management, test-taking strategies, and more.

### A Mentor's Impact on Student Retention

Peer mentors can be a crucial pillar in supporting student retention. Peer mentors help students feel more connected to campus, develop academic success plans, and transition to and through college (especially during their first two years).

In Fall 2023, students who met with peer mentors were retained to Spring 2024 at 93%, and were retained to Fall 2024 at 80%. For the next few weeks, peer mentors will be scattered across campus at various tabling events to chat with students about finishing the semester strong!

### **ICLCA Conference: New Connections**

In September, Assistant Director, Instructional Support Programs **Diana Hernandez**, and Assistant Director, Peer Mentoring & Outreach **Sebastian Oehninger** had the opportunity to attend the annual International College Learning Center Association Conference.

Oehninger expresses, "I was able to learn how big and small universities run their peer mentoring programs, and how I could apply some of those ideas here at ODU." He continues, "The best part of the conference was networking with peers who were there to learn and grow from our shared experience."

Diana Hernandez shares similar insights about learning from other institutions, stating, "The conference offered a chance to connect with practitioners and hear their stories, including successes and challenges." Dr. Hernandez also emphasized the need for adapting ODU's "approaches and methods" to best meet students' changing needs.

## **TUTORING CENTRAL**

ODU has over 12 different tutoring centers across campus supporting hundreds of undergraduate courses and employing dozens of undergraduate peer tutors.

Academic Success Initiatives collaborates with all tutoring centers to discuss, coordinate, and evaluate efforts related to formalized tutoring services for students at Old Dominion University with the common goals of supporting student learning in the classroom, improving students' academic performance in challenging courses, and increasing student retention.

# WHO ARE THE TUTOR.COM TUTORS?



Tutor.com Tutors go through a rigorous vetting process, with requiring at least a bachelor's degree and passing a multi-step qualification process. Once hired, tutors are evaluated informally by their mentors on a monthly basis and formally every 90 days.

Tutor.Com is individualized and on-demand. Students are able to connect with qualified tutors at any hour, with one-on-one, focused sessions. Tutor.Com also offers their most popular supported courses in different languages!



Tutor.Com is completely free and accessible from any computer or mobile device with internet access. Students can also utilize Tutor.Com through Canvas and the mobile app, **Tutor.com To Go**.



Supported courses were chosen based on previous tutoring usage, student need, and faculty requests. If you don't see a course you need tutoring for, reach out to the Office of Academic Innovation and Learning Support.

Tutor.Com is not used for quick answers to problems. Tutors are dedicated to guide students through a learning process to develop independent problem-solving skills for future assignments.

## **ADVISING AVENUE**

**Stephanie Fahey,** Interim Director, Engineering Student Success, attended the annual NACADA conference with fellow ODU advisors. Here is a quick look at her experience:

"Alongside my colleague, Dr. Nettie Freshour from West Virginia University, I presented a session entitled *Utilizing BRIGHT to Support Academic Advisors and Enhance Advising Training*. In the session, we discussed the integral role of advisors, the factors that lead to advisor burnout, and the steps to mitigate these factors utilizing our research-supported BRIGHT framework. We enjoyed great audience engagement and discussion surrounding best practices for supporting advisors so they can in turn support students.

The NACADA annual conference hosted over 3,000 attendees from around the world. I greatly benefitted from connecting with advising personnel from the global community to learn about the integral student support work they are engaged in at their home institutions. One notable session I attended was about preparing STEM students to become more effective learners. I brought back resources and strategies from that session that we can use to directly assist our students with their studies and promote student success in the College of Engineering."



# (RE)IMAGINE GENERAL EDUCATION AT ODU

### GENERAL EDUCATION REFORM DISCUSSIONS BEGIN

Under the leadership of the **General Education Executive Committee**, ODU aims to engage the campus community in a comprehensive general education review and reform process to envision and implement a general education program that prepares ODU graduates for academic, professional, and civic life.

Many across campus participated in one or more of three Open Forums this fall to discuss general education topics, learn more about progress and next steps, ask questions, and share ideas. Next steps include:

- Convening and charging a General Education Steering Committee
- Developing a reform timeline and progress check-in points
- Devising a plan to continue to engage campus community in the process



## First Star ODU Academy

First Star is the first national long-term college prep program for high school foster youth.

Led by **Alexia Hargrove**, the **Director of First Star ODU Academy**, the program provides high school youth in foster care with the opportunity, tools, and support to successfully transition to self-sufficiency through higher education or other viable pathways.

#### First Star offers...

- **Summer Academy**: an intensive 2-4 week residential enrichment program on a university campus.
- **Virtual Engagement**: Weekly mentoring and tutoring sessions and an open environment to connect and build community through virtual hangouts.
- **Monthly Academies**: Monthly programming over 4 years for First Star Scholars to promote academic and life skills while still in high school.
- **Alumni Program**: Maintaining and connecting the national First Star community beyond the scholars' high school graduation.

And much more specialized programming that addresses the academics, life skills, and adult supports unique to students in foster care.
