New General Education Programmatic Learning Goals

The Steering Committee developed draft learning goals for general education in AY 24/25 with input from student representatives and collaborative reading and working groups that included representation from all colleges and multiple units across campus. These new learning goals were reviewed by Faculty Senate in April 2025 and refined this summer by the AY 25/26 Gen Ed Reform Faculty and Operational Committees.

- 1. **Inquiry and Research:** Students will develop meaningful questions and gather, analyze, and apply information to create knowledge.
- 2. **Reasoning and Problem-Solving:** Students will develop critical reasoning, knowledge, and skills to address problems while considering their implications and the impact of potential solutions.
- 3. Civic Engagement and Social Responsibility: Students will gain insight into political and social systems to participate responsibly in civic life in local, national, or global communities.
- 4. **Communication and Expression:** Students will communicate in diverse ways to promote active participation in academic, artistic, civic, personal, and professional settings.
- 5. **Reflection and Integration:** Students will engage in self-discovery, skill-building, and reflection to foster curiosity, self-motivation, lifelong learning, and overall well-being.

Summer 2025 Highlights

- May 12: New Faculty and Operational Committee members attended an onboarding meeting to get caught up on reform work so far

- August 12: Reform Committee met for a retreat to develop three models to share with the campus community in October for input

What's possible in general education?

One of the texts the Gen Ed Reform team has read as part of this process is Paul Hanstedt's *General Education Essentials: A Guide for College Faculty.* In it, he outlines several potential models for general education, all of which fall on a continuum from distributive (what we have now) to fully integrative ("a model that makes explicit connections among courses, fields, majors, [and] disciplines.") The models we will share with the campus in October imagine what could be possible at ODU with a goal of helping students make those connections as they move through their general education coursework.

General Education Reform Timeline

Year 1 (AY 23/24): Planning, External Review

Year 2 (AY 24/25): Build Community, Develop and Recommend Program Learning Goals

Year 3 (AY 25/26): Develop and Recommend Structure & Student Learning Outcomes

Year 4 (AY 26/27): Goal: Pilot, Assess, Refine, and Seek Full Faculty Senate Approval

Year 5 (AY 27/28): Goal: Faculty and Course Development, Catalog and Schedule Revisions

New program to launch with AY 28/29 catalog with Faculty Senate approval.
