I presented on Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports with Dr. Emily Goodman-Scott and on anxiety disorders in children and adolescents in K-12 settings with Master's student, Emily Sims. VSCA also provided opportunities to network with professional school counselors, gain practical and useful knowledge from sessions, and listen to two engaging and empowering keynote speakers. Tara Brown provided a surprisingly comical and entertaining keynote on neurobiological research, in relation to stress, motivation, and gender differences. She gave school counselors practical applications of this research to the school environment. John Hodge gave a heartfelt and powerful talk on poverty, the achievement gap, barriers to success, and how school counselors can be the one positive influence that changes a child's life. I was fortunate that the VSCA Conference was held in such a convenient location, so I could attend and gain such relevant and influential knowledge.

Next fall, the VSCA Annual Conference will be held in Hampton again and I hope to have a strong ODU presence at this important event!

Therefore, observing interactions of other individuals, having to be ready to present myself, and the intensity of having so many people in one place was an eye-opening experience for me. I am now more aware of the expectations and demands of the field that I am entering. As a result, I believe that attending and presenting at the ACES conference greatly contributed to my professional development.

Third, I released my passion of expanding the profession of counseling to other parts of the world. The presentation Davide Mariotti, Dr. McAuliffe, and I gave was entitled: Broaching International Boundaries: Italian, Russian and American Counselor Educators' Insights from their International Teaching Experiences. During the presentation, we explored our personal and professional experience with cross-cultural counselor education. In speaking with presentation participants later, I learned that they gained insights into specific strategies to use when engaging in counselor education overseas and were thankful for the insights we provided. Therefore, this presentation was a small, but at the same time, a significant step toward expanding the profession of counseling around the world.

ODU was well represented at ACES, with over 49 students, faculty, and alumni making 60 presentations!

A Game Plan for Off the Field: Dr. Del Corso blends Counseling and Sports

Three years ago Professor Jennifer Del Corso (Dr. D) began a pilot program for the full scholarship student athletes at ODU to address life skills and career development needs, particularly freshmen as they transfer into Conference USA Division 1 Athletics. Today, the program has grown in size with plans to expand it to all student athletes at targeted times throughout their college career. The program consists of summer workshops and courses in life skills (Fall) and career development (Spring) for freshmen athletes. Currently, there is one section exclusively for football; and one section for international athletes and full scholarship basketball players. The courses cover an array of topics: Orientation to services on campus, Study Skills, Life Skills for Life Success, Anger Management, Communication Skills, Time Management, Stress Management, Decision Making, Cultural Sensitivity and Diversity, Personal Branding, Social Media, Financial Literacy; Academic Integrity, Adjustment to College Life/College Sports, Drug & Alcohol Literacy, Self-Care/ Adaptive Coping Strategies; Choosing a Major and Life After Sports. Dr. D has utilized masters in counseling students for the past three years to provide interactive experiential group activities to the players. With the support of the NFL Players Association and the Hampton Roads Youth Foundation (which sponsors the Mike Tomlin Steelers Coach Football Camp), Dr. D brings in a variety of former collegiate and professional players, as well as professionals such as President Broderick, Lt. General Neller, Ted Alexander ("Voice of the Monarchs") to encourage and speak to the student athletes. She's appeared on several radio shows and was most recently featured on "Inside Monarch Nation" on ESPN Radio Sportscenter. Her desire is to con-

tinue to grow the program, seek out NCAA grant funding, and continue integrating counseling students (that are passionate about sports counseling) into her program.

Human Services Program Creates Substance Abuse Track for Credentialing

Beginning the 2015-2016 year, the Department of Counseling and Human Services has officially launched its substance abuse track which will allow eligible students to pursue Certified Substance Abuse Counselor (CSAC) or Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor (CADC) credentialing. The implementation of this track is a great opportunity for human service majors and/or minors who will enter the helping field with an advantage over graduates from other institutions.

With the passing of the Affordable Care Act in 2010, substance abuse concerns will now become a Medicaid reimbursable diagnosis which means that credentialing in this area is a must for human service graduates who aim to work with this population.

In meeting the change of the helping field, Old Dominion University's human service program has aligned five courses in addition to internship with the Virginia Board of Counseling and Psychology's didactic requirements for CSAC credentialing. These courses include:

HMSV 341: Introduction to Human Services

HMSV 444: Psychoeducational Groups

HMSV 447: Introduction to Substance Abuse

HMSV 368: Field Observation

HMSV 452: Substance Abuse Treatment and Research.

For the CADC, the substance abuse track has been approved by the Virginia Certification Board with HMSV 491 Family Guidance added to the lineup.

A major highlight of this track is the addition of two new human service courses, HMSV 447 Introduction to Substance Abuse and HMSV 452: Substance Abuse Treatment and Research which are both required for the CSAC and CADC. Interested Human Service students have already begun to take the first of these new courses, HMSV 447 and had the following to say:

"I am very glad that I took this course. I took it because I wanted to increase my knowledge of alcohol and drug addiction. Not only have I learned a great deal about the substance abuse field, but I also feel more equipped in practical knowledge of the human services profession. This class goes over documentation, supervision and assessment in a way that is relevant to all areas of human services. This combined with the experiential learning outside of the classroom has made this one of the classes that has most prepared me to go into human services." —Bethany W.

"I originally signed up for HMSV 447 because the subject interested me, but upon attending classes I have really come to enjoy the course as a whole. One of the main reasons I enjoyed this course is because it is the first course I have taken in the Human Services department that goes into depth about creating treatment plans. In-class discussions are geared toward possible goals and referrals for clients, which helped me feel more comfortable with treatment plans and a Human Services career in general. What initially started as another 3-credit course I needed to take to graduate, turned into a possible career direction I have begun considering." – Jessica K. (continued on page 15)

"Participating in the 21 days of abstinence and community based support group projects was the perfect hands-on experience that you do not get in most regular classes. I found out what it is actually like to go through withdrawals from my chosen substance and got to experience the unbelievable joy that comes with making it the whole 21 days. Also, I had the opportunity to meet some wonderful people that completely changed the way I view individuals that struggle with addiction. The members of these NA and AA meetings were some of the most inspirational people I have met in my entire life and I will carry their stories with me for as long as I live." —Aubrey H.

"I think anyone who takes this class will benefit. We learned about different drugs and what they do to your body physically and mentally. There is a wide range of knowledge a future practitioner in substance abuse treatment needs to learn. This class is a general introduction to substance abuse. It allows the student to realize if this is a field they would be interested in pursuing for a career." —Sarah P.

The Substance Abuse track is available both land based and online for human service majors or minors. The track will continue its launch throughout the 2015-2016 school year with HMSV 452 being offered both land based and online beginning the Spring 2016 semester.

"Bridges" Crisis Intervention Team opens in Chesapeake

The "Bridges" Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) assessment center opened its doors to the community on October 1, 2015. Located at Chesapeake Regional Medical Center (CRMC), the center is open 24/7 and staffed by CIT certified law enforcement officers (LEOs) and crisis mental health clinicians. CIT programs are found in abundance throughout the U.S. and more recently in other countries. The CIT model typically involves a partnership between local law enforcement, community mental health, advocacy groups and an assessment center facility. CIT certification training for LEOs consists of a 40 hour curriculum that increases knowledge, skills and awareness related to encounters with community members experiencing various types of mental health challenges. It is a voluntary training but typically well attended. The overarching goal of the CIT program is to promote access, dignity and justice for individuals who are in danger of being criminalized due to a primary mental health problem. The assessment center serves as a safe harbor access point for evaluation for such individuals.

The Bridges CIT staffing costs are funded by a state CIT grant. As the Director of Behavioral Health Services for CRMC, I serve as the Bridges CIT project manager. I was challenged by a wide range of unfamiliar tasks including oversight of design and construction, developing the MOU between partners, ensuring legal compliance and working with the media. I was thrilled that the hospital leadership embraced the program from the get go as the CIT goals are well aligned with the mission and values of our unique medical facility.

CIT programs are strongly rooted in advocacy. As a counselor, advocacy is fundamental to my professional (and personal) identity. The ODU counseling Ph.D. program is effectively steeped in advocacy throughout many domains: Course content, mentorship, practical experience, supervision, and dissertation. I am thankful that the program nurtured this spirit of advocacy within me, and am privileged to be in a position to advocate alongside those whose struggles require more courage that I can comprehend. For those interested in gaining practical experience during your graduate internship, I encourage you to consider CRMC as a dynamic, inter-professional venue to work with a wide variety of clients.


